Ryan Dendulk, 40, Cheeyo Trace Loudon, was charged with DUI.

Deputy Branson LCSO, initiated a traffic stop after observing a 2020 Kia SPT with Tennessee tag 941BHWY traveling 75 mph in a 50 mph and crossing the yellow lines multiple times on Highway 444.

Upon making contact with the driver, Ryan Dendulk, Deputy Branson identified himself and asked Mr. Dendulk for his driver's license. Mr. Dendulk gave Deputy Branson a credit card instead. During the interaction with Mr. Dendulk, Deputy Branson stated he seemed spaced out with a slow speech. Deputy Branson asked Mr. Dendulk to exit the vehicle.

Deputy Branson stated upon Mr. Dendulk exiting the vehicle he had to instruct him approximate-



to an indictment charging him with, one count of exploitation of a child in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 2251(a); and one count of receipt of child pornography in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 2252A(a)(2). Roark was sentenced to 300 months in prison, followed by a lifetime of supervised release. Roark will be required to register with state sex offender registries and comply with special sex offender conditions during his supervised release.

In early October 2023, Scott County Virginia Sheriff's Department (SCVSD) received an anonymous tip that a juvenile female (JV) was sending child pornography through the internet to other potential internet users. A forensic examination of a cellphone belonging to JV's mother revealed child pornography images of JV as well as text mes-

sages between JV's mother and Roark while he was employed with the Knoxville Police Department. In the text message communications, Roark demanded that JV's mother provide child pornography depicting JV. JV's mother complied by sending child pornography images and videos depicting JV to Roark.

The criminal indictment was the result of an investigation by the SCVSD, 9th Judicial District Attorney General's Office (9th JDA-GO), and Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Internet Crimes Against Children's Task Force. This investigation was led by Detective Daniel Ross of SCVSD, HSI Task Force Officer Cortney Dugger, and Investigator Chanel Finnell of the 9th JDAGO.

Assistant United States Attorney Jennifer Kolman represented the United States.

Craft Fair

Cody Chambers, 33, Interprise Maryville, was charged with, DUI, Violation of Implied Consent, Open Container, and Financial Responsibility.

Officer. H. Wilkes LCPD, was conducting traffic control for an Arts & Crafts event along City Park Dr. When approaching a gray Nissan Altima, bearing Tennessee, BRR5436, The officer observed the driver of the vehicle, Cody Chambers, make direct eye contact with him and then quickly stuff something into the passenger side floorboard. After approaching the window to provide traffic directions, the officer observed the odor of an al-

coholic beverage emitting from the vehicle, and his eyes to be bloodshot and glossy. Furthermore, I observed an open 'Bahama Mama' in the cupholder. While speaking with Mr. Chambers, I observed his movements to be slow and his speech to be slurred. At that time, Mr. Chambers was instructed to pull his vehicle off of the roadway, where he was instructed to shut the engine off and exit the vehicle. In addition, Mr. Chambers stated that he did not have insurance on his vehicle. Mr. Chambers initially stated that he consumed alcohol the night prior, but then admitted to consuming alcohol this morning, and





Project Introduction

Lenoir City Utilities Board (LCUB), an independent agency of Lenoir City, provides electric, natural gas, water, and wastewater services to more than 95,255 customers in Lenoir City and parts of four surrounding counties, making LCUB the eighth-largest utility among TVA distributors.

LCUB's electric system serves a 208-square-mile service area and relies on 2,349 miles of service lines to serve approximately 76,388 customers daily. LCUB will upgrade its electric grid and implement innovative technologies that improve reliability and efficiency to meet its customers' changing needs and expectations.

In addition to improving LCUB's electric system, the electric fiber network required for these systems will position LCUB to provide broadband services to meet the growing needs of its customers and community. Many applications for these improvements depend on fast and reliable communication throughout the service territory, which an extensive fiber system can best provide.

Project Overview

Fiber infrastructure plays a critical role in future system applications that require low latency and high-reliability communication to make real-time decisions for the electric grid. Over the next several years,

- LCUB plans to expand its Fault Location Isolation and Restoration (FLISR) program from 12 to 250 devices across the electric distribution system.
- LCUB will eventually connect all LCUB infrastructure and improve the reliability of

- LCUB's Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) network.
- The fiber infrastructure will improve communications for Distributed Energy Resources (DER).
- The fiber system will allow Volt/VAR Optimization applications to be deployed.
- The fiber infrastructure will position LCUB to implement Demand Response (DR) programs on the electric system and offer customers controllable thermostats, water heaters, and other heavy electric load devices within their homes.
- The fiber infrastructure will provide next-generation Automated Metering Infrastructure (AMI) options.
- The broadband services that LCUB will offer will help offset the cost of its infrastructure upgrades for the benefit of its electric utility customers.

During the first year, areas were built to serve approximately 22,000 eligible customers. The infrastructure for the remaining 54,388 customers will be built over the next two years of deployment, resulting in a three-year deployment for the entire electric service territory.

LCUB anticipates approximately 1,500 miles of fiber to be constructed over the three-year build-out period. The completed build is projected to serve more than 20,000 customers while passing more than 58,000 homes and 11,000 businesses with internet and voice services across a four-county area. The fiber build will add to the existing fiber network and will be a mix of 55% aerial / 45% underground.

The network uses PON to interconnect LCUB's devices and offer multi-gig services to 100% of LCUB members via XGS-PON.

Project construction plans started in 2022 Q1.

Project Scope:

This RFP will provide pricing for the installation service of fiber optic cable into existing primary and secondary electrical conduits by qualified personnel who work near or around high-voltage lines. In some cases, this will require entry into utility transformer cabinets or entry through existing transformer bases to pull nonmetallic fiber cable adjacent to secondary power, and in some cases, primary power. LCUB Journeyman Lineman will be present during all installations.

Safely enter existing transformers or transformer bases and install (pull) nonmetallic fiber cable alongside secondary power in existing underground conduit. This would be from an outside transformer inside a building. Once inside, the cable would need to break outside the meter bases or power box and be coiled for internal connections.

In addition, crews may need to follow primary (7200V) conduit from riser poles in transitional applications from aerial to underground handholes/vaults or possibly transformer pads. Crews may also be requested to place small or large handholes on job sites and place conduits between handholes, poles, or transformers. This could include hand digging, excavating, or other methods.

○ **Line Items**

- Contractor will report and receive all work from LCUB's Fiber OSP Manager
- LCUB will provide the necessary material to perform each job. The contractor will coordinate with the material warehouse to collect the required materials to complete the installation. Consumables are the Contractor's responsibility.
- Contractor will install the fiber and vaults per LCUB Installation standards.

- The contractor will have an LCUB journeyman lineman present for each installation of fiber in power conduit
- Contractor will provide weekly updates on progress and completions.

RFP Terminology:

- Throughout the RFP documents, references to "Bidder", "Company", "Contractor", and "Partner" mean the company proposing LCUB for this project.

This will be used for your one seat in the Q&A forum portal.

The final proposal must have physical paper copies in a sealed bid in the hands of LCUB by the Proposals Due Date. Any proposals received after that will not be accepted.

Unsigned proposals will not be considered. Telephone or electronic versions of proposals will not be accepted. All Proposals must reference the RFP name on the outside of the returned proposal. Overall, this project will have multiple RFPs. If a Contractor chooses to provide a proposal on additional RFPs that are issued, each RFP must be sent in separately, with the RFP clearly marked on the outside of the envelope.

Do NOT include multiple RFP responses in the same envelope.

RFP Scope

The proposal will need to provide a Solution to cover the following areas:

- **Price per foot for installation of various fiber sizes in power conduit**
- **Price per vault installation for various sizes**

Each proposal will be required to meet a set of minimum mandatory requirements. Proposals that do not meet these criteria will not be considered. Compulsory minimum requirements are:

- Proposals must be signed.
- Contractor must be licensed to perform the Work described in Tennessee and the Town of Farragut.
- Contractor must have previous experience in installing fiber optic cable in power conduit systems
- The proposal includes the appropriate bond required.
- The Returned Proposal must include the **Contractor's Safety Manual and the Safety Director's resume.**
- The Returned Proposal must include the RFP name "*Fiber Install in Power Conduit System RFP*" on the outside of the returned RFP envelope.



on his drive to work. When asked about illegal items in the vehicle, he stated after seeing me, he hid an open 'Clubtails Margarita' under a sweatshirt in the passenger floorboard. Both alcoholic beverages in the vehicle were open and ice cold. Mr. Chambers was asked to perform SFST's, to which he consented. 
Kaden then made contact with the listed offender where he was then detained and brought into the A.P. office. During the in-
