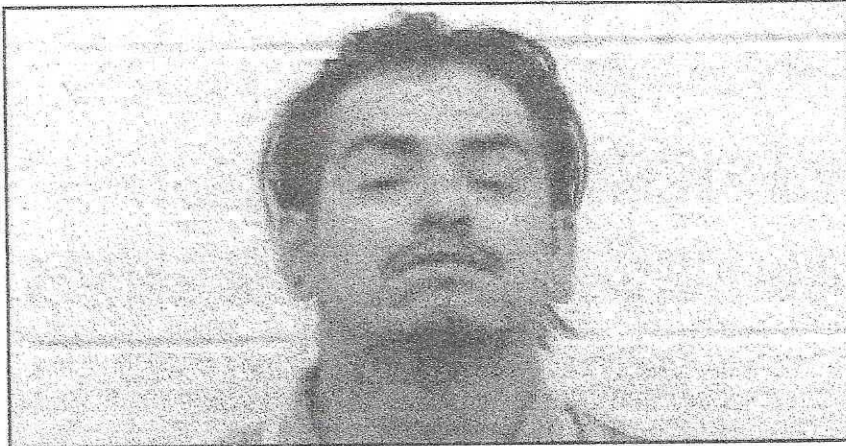

People's Republic of China cyber threat activity

PRC cyber actors target telecommunications companies as part of a global cyber-espionage campaign

The Canadian Centre for Cyber Security (Cyber Centre) and the United States' Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) are warning Canadians of the threat posed by People's Republic of China (PRC) state-sponsored cyber threat actor tracked in industry reporting as Salt Typhoon. The Cy-

ber Centre previously joined our partners in warning that PRC cyber actors have compromised networks of major global telecommunications providers to conduct a broad and significant cyber espionage campaign. This cyber bulletin aims to raise awareness of the threat posed by PRC cyber threat activity, particularly to Canadian telecommunications organizations, in

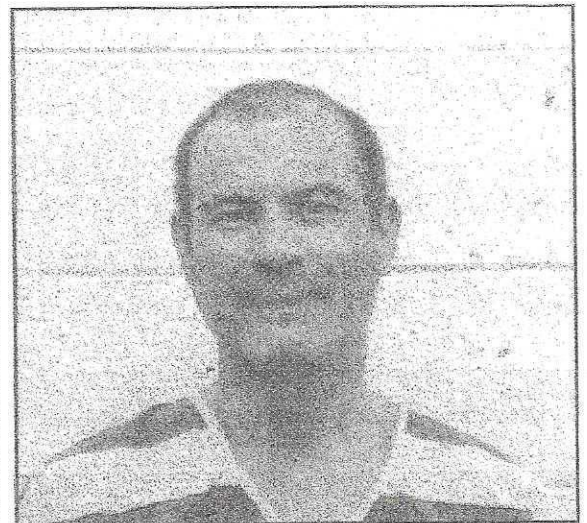

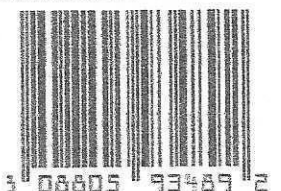
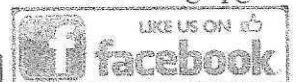

Josue Salinas, 33, Bell Road Antioch, was charged with, DUI 3rd, Poss. of Handgun while under the Influence, Driving on Revoked/Suspended License; and Poss. of Drug Para.

Trooper H. Singh THP, was sitting stationary on interstate 40 at the crossover located at mile marker 366. The trooper vehicle was facing northbound, and he was observing westbound traffic. The trooper observed a white standard pickup truck driving westbound in the left lane. As the vehicle passed his location, the trooper observed the driver put his face down and cover it. As the rear of the vehicle passed his location, the trooper did not initially observe a license plate displayed on the rear of the vehicle. The vehicle then switched from

the left lane to the right lane. The trooper observed the vehicle fail to maintain its lane numerous times by crossing over the fog line that separates the right lane and the shoulder. The trooper activated his lights and sirens and noticed the vehicle to be slow to stop.

The trooper made a passenger side approach and immediately noticed an obvious odor of alcohol emanating from the driver. He was the sole occupant in the vehicle. The trooper also observed a closed tall boy can of Modelo beer on the front driver's seat. The subject was observed to be slightly unsteady on his feet when exiting the vehicle and while walking to the front of his patrol car. He stated that he only had 2 tall boy beers and those were hours ago. He did agree to perform SFSTs. Lack of smooth pur-

suit was observed. Distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation was also observed. During the walk and turn, the subject made an improper turn and started on a different line. During the one leg stand, the subject was observed swaying on one leg and putting his foot down before the time was up. Lack of convergence was observed in the right eye. During the Romberg balance test, the subject was observed swaying front to back and side to side approximately 2 inches. He had an internal clock of 28 seconds. The subject did miss some finger-to-nose as well.

Based on the totality of the circumstances of the subject's driving

and his performance on SFSTs/ARIDE, he is being charged with DUI 3rd (prior DUIs on 03/05/2020 and 03/26/2022). An NCIC check of the subject's Tennessee ID yielded him to be driving while revoked in the state of Tennessee. An inventory of the subject's vehicle yielded a glass pipe. Based on my training and experience, the trooper believed the pipe to be consistent with smoking of marijuana. It also resembled an odor of burnt marijuana.

The subject was also in possession of a loaded firearm (Smith & Wesson .44 Magnum 629 #DRX4863) on the front passenger seat. Said events occurred in Loudon County, Tennessee on a public roadway.

The threat to Canadian organizations

The Cyber Centre is aware of malicious cyber activities currently targeting Canadian telecommunications companies. The responsible actors are almost certainly PRC state-sponsored actors, specifically Salt Typhoon.

Three network devices registered to a Canadian telecommunications company were compromised by likely Salt Typhoon actors in mid-February 2025. The actors exploited CVE-2023-20198 to retrieve the running configuration files from all three devices and modified at least one of the files to configure a GRE tunnel, enabling traffic collection from the network.

In separate investigations, the Cyber Centre has found overlaps with malicious indicators associated with Salt Typhoon, reported by our partners and through industry reporting, which suggests that this targeting is broader than just the telecommunications sector. Targeting of Canadian devices may allow the threat actors to collect information from the victim's internal network, or use the victim's device to enable the compromise of further victims. In some cases, we assess that the threat actors' activities were very likely limited to network reconnaissance.

While our understanding of this activity continues to

evolve, we assess that PRC cyber actors will almost certainly continue to target Canadian organizations as part of this espionage campaign, including telecommunications service providers and their clients, over the next two years. To monitor and mitigate this threat, we encourage Canadian organizations to consult the guidance linked below on hardening networks, security considerations for edge devices, and additional cyber threat information pertaining to the PRC.

The threat to telecommunications

Telecommunications networks are almost certainly among the highest priority espionage targets for state-sponsored cyber threat actors. Hostile state actors very likely rely on access to telecommunications service providers (TSPs) and telecommunications networks around the world as a key source of foreign intelligence collection. TSPs carry telecommunications traffic and collect and store large amounts of customer data that have intelligence value, including communication, location, and device data.

State-sponsored cyber threat actors have persistently compromised TSPs globally, often as part of broad and long-running intelligence programs to exfiltrate bulk customer data and collect information on high-value targets of interest, such as government officials. This includes geolocating and tracking individuals, monitoring phone calls, and intercepting SMS messages. State

actors have gained access to telecommunications networks and data by exploiting vulnerabilities in network devices, such as routers, and by taking advantage of insecure design in the systems that route, bill, and manage communications.

In 2024, partner investigations discovered that PRC state-sponsored cyber threat actors had compromised the networks of major global TSPs, including US wireless carriers, very likely as part of a targeted espionage operation. According to our partners, the actors were able to steal customer call records data from the compromised TSPs. The threat actors also collected the private communications of a limited number of individuals primarily involved in government or political activity.

We are also concerned with the potential impacts to the sensitive information of client organizations working directly with telecommunications providers. PRC cyber threat actors frequently attempt to compromise trusted service providers, including telecommunications, managed service providers and cloud service providers, to access client information or networks indirectly.

PRC cyber actors exploit vulnerabilities in edge devices

As we note in the National Cyber Threat Assessment 2025-2026, cyber threat actors are exploiting vulnerabilities in security and networking devices that sit at the perimeter of networks, including routers, firewalls, and virtual private network (VPN) solutions. By compromising these edge devices, a cyber threat actor can enter a network, monitor, modify, and exfiltrate network traffic flowing through the device, or possibly move deeper into the victim network.

As part of this campaign, PRC cyber actors are targeting these network devices, exploiting existing vulnerabilities to gain and maintain access to TSPs. Despite public reporting outlining their activities, it is very likely that the actors continue to operate.

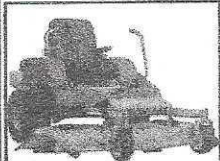

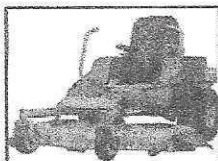

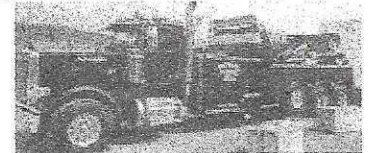

Edward Radford, 49, Pleasant View Avenue Maryville, was charged with DUI, and Possession of Handgun While Under the Influence.

Sgt. Pesterfield LCSO, was traveling on East Coast Tellico Parkway near Morganton Cemetery Road. Sgt. witnessed a red Smart Car parked in the opposite lane of travel on the bridge. Sgt. approached the vehicle and noticed that the driver's door was open, but it was positioned so close to the bridge wall that the door would not open completely. A man was sitting in the driver's seat with the vehicle running. The Sgt. identified the driver as Mr. Edward Radford. The Sgt. noticed Mr. Radford had constricted pupils, slowed, slurred, and thick speech, and was unsteady on his feet. Sgt. asked Mr. Radford the last time he consumed anything illegal, and he responded that he used crack cocaine six months ago. He later changed this to somewhere between four and nine months ago. Mr. Radford said he was prescribed Subox-

one and Adderall and said he consumed Suboxone just prior to our encounter. Mr. Radford was drowsy, and on multiple occasions, while speaking with him, he closed his eyes as if he was nodding off. Sgt. asked Mr. Radford to perform standardized field sobriety testing (SFSTs), which he agreed to. After performing the HGN test, I asked Mr. Radford to attempt the walk-and-turn test, which was terminated after multiple attempts to get into and maintain the starting position. Mr. Radford said he had knee problems, which prevented him from completing the test. However, he acknowledged that he performed physically demanding work as part of his employment. Sgt. placed Mr. Radford in custody at that time and read him the TN implied consent advisement, to which he agreed to supply a blood sample for testing. On the front passenger seat of the vehicle, Deputy Phegley located a Glock 22 .40 caliber handgun with fourteen rounds of ammunition and an HK 9mm handgun with ten rounds of am-

munition. Sgt. transported Mr. Radford to Fort Loudoun Medical Center, where the blood draw was conducted. Sgt. then transported him to the Loudon County Detention Center without incident. The above actions did occur in Loudon County, TN.

store with various items. The items included a Dr. Pepper hat, car fresheners, and energy drinks. The males fled on foot and eventually made it to their vehicle, in which they fled the scene. The loss prevention team provided security camera footage of the vehicle, a dark colored Pontiac sedan with partial Tennessee registration 942 and the males description. Officer Garren, was able to identify one of the males, as Kristopher Phillips, from previous encounters.

The officer was able to locate the vehicle, a dark colored Pontiac sedan bear-

ing Tennessee registration 942BGYK, at 503 Highway 321 N at approximately 22:44. The officer observed Kristopher Phillips exiting his vehicle, walking toward the front office of the Inn of Lenoir. The officer made contact with Kristopher in the parking lot and detained him in regards to the shoplifting. Kristopher admitted to Officer Tatham and Garren, that he had taken a hat and some energy drinks and fled the scene.

At this time, Kristopher was taken into custody. The hat was recovered out of Kristopher's car, on scene. Kristopher intentionally deprived the merchant of the stated price of merchandise by passing all points of sale and evading the loss prevention team on foot and fleeing in a vehicle.

Kristopher was transported to the Loudon County Jail without incident.



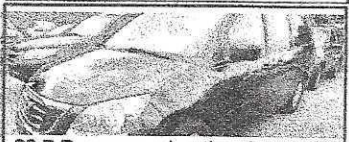

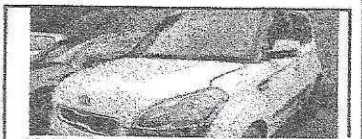

Reckless

John Townsend, 30, Grove Road Ohio, was Charged with, DUI, Reckless Endangerment, Due Care, and Aggravated Assault.

Deputy Edgmon LCSO, was advised by dispatch that they were receiving multiple complaints of a reckless driver on Interstate 75. The complainant advised a white van was attempting to pass a tractor trailer, and a truck. The reckless driver was swerving attempting to pass coming very close to striking both vehicles. The driver then began tailgating the truck appearing to attempt to run the vehicle off the roadway. She stated as they were approaching the 68MM exit the van swerved onto the shoulder almost causing the other vehicles to wreck. As they were traveling north the

driver of the van continued swerving between lanes, and began brake checking her along with an unknown victim in a Buick sedan. This continued on until approximately the 82MM when the driver of the van began slowing his speeds, and swerved in front of the victim. As she was attempting to get over to avoid a collision with the van it came to a complete stop in the right lane in front of her. She stated the male driver then exited his vehicle, and began approaching her vehicle. At that time she sped around the van, and continued north. The driver of the van began pursuing the victim. She stated he began tailgating her so she attempted increasing her speeds to get away from the vehicle. She stated she had reached speeds of approximately 90 mph with the van still fol-

lowing her very aggressively. Cpl. Dishner conducted a traffic stop on the van at the 373 MM. The driver was identified John Townsend. He stated he had been involved in a road rage incident. While conversing with Mr. Townsend he appeared to have a slow response time, pinpoint pupils, and difficulty walking upon exiting his vehicle. Cpl. Dishner made contact with the victim who was very visually shaken, and upset. She stated due to his behavior he placed her in

fear of being wrecked, and seriously injured. The deputy also performed SFST to which he performed poorly. Mr. Townsend was placed in custody.
